Careers in Law

Gemma Seymour came in to speak to students in the school about being a solicitor. Having worked for Simmonds and Simmonds, a large corporate law firm, and more latterly working in-house as a solicitor for a law firm, Gemma was able to give a detailed insight into the field of law. Students learnt about relevant qualifications, what a solicitor does on a daily basis and the skills you need and develop. We also learnt about balancing work with family life. The talk was extremely inspiring encouraging students to think about careers for the future and the importance of hard work. Students in Year 11 asked some fantastic questions and it was clear from the amount of students who stayed afterwards that this is a career that students are really keen to pursue.



Fast track to the Civil Service

Halima Akhtar came to speak to students in Years 12 and 13 about the Fast track into the Civil Service scheme. Halima, completed the process just two years ago and explained to students the complex six stages to reach a place on the scheme. Halima explained about the role of the civil service and how it is integral to the work governments do. Halima is currently working on a response to the Grenfell Tower tragedy and it was incredibly powerful to here about the important work being done on this. Students were able to ask questions, the first being 'how much do you get paid!' But were left with a greater understanding of what a valued and varied role working in the civil service is.

We are particularly pleased to see the collaborative nature of students teaching one another. 

Missing Matches



Year 9 Parents' Evening is on Tuesday 10th March 2020. The aim of the event is to:


- Help you understand how your child is doing in each subject
