Many of our students are learning to play an instrument or further developing their musical skills through our free guitar, brass and strings lessons each Friday.


# Year 7 voices

## MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

### Crooked calculator

Eric has got all the sums wrong. Each time he pressed exactly **one** wrong key.

$$\begin{aligned} \% 25 + 36 &= 900 \\ \% 5 + 3 + 2 &= 317 \\ \% 8 + 8 + 2 &= 3 \\ \% \sqrt{16} + 1 &= 41 \end{aligned}$$

Can you work out which keys he actually pressed?

Eric manages to press the right keys but gets them in the wrong order.

Can you get the keys in the right order?

$$\begin{aligned} \% 23 + 56 &= 61 \\ \% 5 + 3 - 2 &= 0 \\ \% 8 + 842 &= 103 \\ \% \sqrt{31} + 6 &= 7 \end{aligned}$$

### Answer:


$$\begin{aligned} \% 25 \times 36 &= 900 \\ \% 5 + 312 &= 317 \\ \% 8 \div 8 + 2 &= 3 \\ \% \sqrt{16} + 81 &= 41 \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \% 25 + 36 &= 61 \\ \% 3 + 2 - 5 &= 0 \\ \% 824 \div 8 &= 103 \\ \% \sqrt{36} + 1 &= 7 \end{aligned}$$
