Northern

History students from Year 12 and 13 had the opportunity to attend a 3-day trip to Belfast, where we could delve into the history of 'The Troubles', and its impact on the divide between Ireland and Northern Ireland, along with Britain's role and influence in Northern Ireland. During the trip, we looked at the Belfast international wall, which turned into a mural for Palestinian and Israeli art. The Palestinian murals were created by Catholic supporters, whereas the Israeli murals were created by Protestant supporters. Next to these murals was a mural of Bobby Sands, who was a member of the Irish Republican Army and died at the age of 27 due to a hunger strike. In addition to this, we also visited the Titanic Museum, which even had a ride taking us on a journey overlooking the process in creating and setting off the Titanic. On the second day, we visited the Ulster Museum, where we looked more into 'The Troubles', holding pieces such as records and belongings of citizens who lost them due to fires.



After this, we were able to go inside Stormont Parliament where we got a tour and the experience of being in the rooms where debates took place. To end our trip, we explored the Cremlin Road Jail which many usually went to face execution or labour, along with seeing the Irish Republican Museum, and had the opportunity to go around and look at the city centre. From this trip, we were able to get a more enhanced reflection on the history and culture of Northern Ireland and were able to explore the city and get an insight on the long-term impacts of 'The Troubles'.

Kings College London Ireland Trip K+ Programme

be given a contextual offer of a twograde reduction in entry requirements. Aliyah had a different experience, she had three of the five events held in year 12; the induction day where they were briefed of the program and given kings lanyards and accounts. Then came the Uni life day, where she experienced a day as a medical student. The day began with a panel of medical professionals who gave the group an insight of their journey to their positions and a breakdown of their occupations. Afterwards they were given a tour of the Guys campushome to medicine. Concluding the day, they were taught practical lessons like taking blood samples and measuring blood pressure. The Academic Day was where we experienced a real lecture and were taught how to take a patient's medical history. She stated "I'm glad that I applied for this program as it's a great opportunity for me to gain experience that can put me ahead when applying for university."
