Elsewhere in the school, girls from a range of year groups had an assembly celebrating both their achievements in school and the achievements of women around the world. Several influential female speakers in important professional roles (such as Joanna Abeyie MBE, Founder and CEO of Blue Moon & Partners) delivered workshops for some of our

girls and several of our Sixth Form students were invited to have Afternoon Tea the CEO of Mulberry Schools Trust, Dr Vanessa Ogden CBE. Throughout the day, there was a real sense of the camaraderie, celebration, and joviality that characterise life at MAS.

Global Girl Leading

Global Girl Leading is a leadership development program 'by girls, for girls', which was initially started by our sister school, Mulberry School for Girls, which pioneered this ongoing project.

It was set up in 2016 following Michelle Obama's visit to the school. This year the program's crescendo consists of a day-long Global Girl Leading Summit on Friday 11th October 2024. This will take place at the Queen Elizabeth II Conference Centre in Westminster, where speakers and students from around the world will come together to discuss and celebrate women's leadership at local, national and global levels

For this, three of MAS's girls have been carefully selected (a difficult decision amidst all the female excellence on show within the school's walls) to

attend a steering group, which is where students from across the trust gather to discuss how to further develop systems for girls to excel within education and within society more widely. At the most recent one, our students enjoyed sitting in a mock-up boardroom style environment at the Mulberry School for Girls to acquaint themselves with one another. In attendance was the recently elected Youth Mayor of Tower Hamlets, Fetuma Hassan, All students were invited to share their most treasured female role model in their lives and, despite the criteria extending to women with celebrity status, almost



half of the attendees cited their own mother as the individual who had inspired them and shaped them into the young women sat together around the table. This is an illuminating testimony to the sacrifices made by mothers for their daughters as well as to the gratitude demonstrated by the girls across Mulberry Schools Trust. Well done to Naima Da Silva and Lilah Jazz Pacheco, both from Year 9, and Diana Lita, from Year 12, for being selected to take part in this year's edition of the program. Mulberry Academy Shoreditch is certainly not short of amazing women and young girls who excel in their academic and personal lives!

A Trip to Central London to Celebrate Women in STEM

Last week, 10 Year 9 girls travelled to South Kensington to attend a deeply inspiring event held at the Royal Geographical Society called 'Inspiring Careers of the Future'. The event was focused upon women in STEM and encouraging girls to raise their aspirations, particularly to entering male-dominated and white-dominated fields of work. The event was put on

by The Female Lead, an enormously successful global charity with millions of followers, which helps to shape a fairer and more equal society for women, in work and in life.

In attendance was the Director of GCHQ, Anne Keast-Butler, the UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency as well as hugely successful women leading and working within Google, EA (Electronic



Arts) and the digital fashion company, Institute of Digital Fashion. These speakers told our students how they had achieved what they had achieved and shared advice about how women and young girls can assert their personal and professional rights within roles typically populated by male candidates.

All students were really engaged with the speakers and had the opportunity to stay behind to ask questions. The event was an insight into the world of work for leading female experts across influential companies and it was a huge privilege for MAS to be part of this.
