Well done and thank you to all that got involved with our celebration of World Book Day!



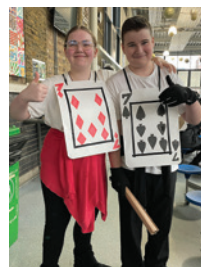
Idea Store Whitechapel

MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

The Pythagoras Patisseries sells triangular cakes at 39p each and square buns at 23p each. For her party, Helen spent exactly £5.12 on an assortment of these cakes and buns.

How many items in total did she buy?

ANSWER: 16 items

One cake and one bun cost a total of 62p. Note that $512 \div 62 = 8$ remainder 16 and note also that $16 = 39 - 23$. Hence $512 = 8(39 + 23) + 16 = 8(39 + 23) + 39 - 23 = 9 \times 39 + 7 \times 23$. As 39 and 23 do not have a common factor, other than 1, Helen must have bought 9 cakes and 7 buns.
