Year 9 Theatre Workshop



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MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

Sonia wants to write a positive five-digit integer whose digits are 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 in some order.

The first digit of the integer is to be divisible by 1, the first two digits are to form a two-digit integer divisible by 2, the first three digits are to form a three-digit integer divisible by 3, the first four digits are to form a four-digit integer divisible by 4 and the five-digit integer itself is to be divisible by 5. How many such five-digit integers could Sonia write?

ANSWER: 0

Suppose such a five-digit integer exists. Since it is to be divisible by 5, its last digit must be 5. The two-digit integer consisting of the first two digits and the four-digit integer consisting of the first four digits are to be divisible by 2 and by 4 respectively. Therefore the second and the fourth digits of the five-digit integer are both even. Therefore the five-digit integer is of the form $2^{4}45$ or $4^{4}25$, with the missing digits being 1 and 3 in some order. The three-digit integer made up of the first three digits is to be divisible by 3 and hence the sum of the first three digits should be divisible by 3. However neither 143 nor 341 is divisible by 3 and hence the five-digit integer is of the form $2^{4}45$. But neither 1234 nor 3214 is divisible by 4. Therefore the re are no possible five-digit integers that Sonia could write.

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
