
Year 7 had a workshop about the concept of consent. Year 8 had a drugs and Alcohol education session. Year 9



Year 8 Students Take Part in Inspiring Diversity Role Models Workshops

On Wednesday 20th November, all Year 8 students participated in Diversity Role Models (DRM) workshops. The sessions aimed to foster greater understanding and inclusivity, encouraging students to embrace diversity in all its forms.

Delivered by experienced facilitators, from the Diversity Role Models charity; the workshops included personal stories from role models who shared their lived experiences, providing unique insights into topics such as identity, discrimination, and the importance of allyship. The interactive format allowed students to ask questions and engage in meaningful discussions, creating a safe space to challenge stereotypes and reflect on their own attitudes and behaviour.

Feedback from students was positive, with many expressing how the workshops helped them think more deeply about the impact of words and actions. One student remarked, "It really showed me how we can support each other and be more understanding."

We are proud to provide opportunities like this that help build a more inclusive school community.











MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

Some fish, some dogs and some children are swimming in a bay. There are 40 legs in total, twice as many heads as tails and more dogs than fish. How many fish are in the bay?

ANSWER: 2

Let the numbers of dogs, fish and children in the bay be d,f,c respectively. Then the total number of legs is 4d+2c, the number of heads is d+f+c and the number of tails is d+f. Therefore, $4d+2c=40\dots[1]$ and $d+f+c=2(d+f)\dots[2]$.

From [1]: c=20-2d. Substituting for c in [2] now gives d+f+20-2d=2d+2f. So 3d+f=20 and we know d>f. Therefore 4d>20 (so d>5) and $3d\leq 20$ (so $d\leq 6$). Therefore d=6 and d=20-18=2. So there are two fish in the bay.



COMMUNITY CORNER

Head Girl, Diana Lita interviews Sixth Form Administration Officer Mrs Morgan Black and former MAS students and Teaching Assistants Mr H Ahmed and Ms F Ibrahim



Diana: Tell us about a challenge you have overcome in your career journey?

Mr Ahmed: Initially, I didn't have any prior experience of supporting students with additional needs, but I took courses to develop myself so that I can support the students I work with to the best of my ability and meet their learning needs.

Diana: Can you describe a moment in your career that you are particularly proud of?

Mr Ahmed: There is a student I worked with who I feel I was able to help a lot. We worked on his independence and his confidence and now I see him engaging more with others and exploring more of the school beyond the inclusion area.

Ms Morgan Black: My best moments are when I'm able to make someone who is having a bad day smile. It's rewarding to help turn a student's day around by helping them through their emotions.

Diana: What support systems and mentors have been crucial in your career development?

Ms Ibrahim: Ms Fabian knew me when I was a student. She has always supported and encouraged me. I'm inspired by Ms James, by seeing another black person in a senior leadership role.

Diana: What inspired you to want to work in a school?

Mr Ahmed: In 2022 I went to Somalia and witnessed the challenges in the education system. I vowed to come back to the UK to work in education to develop my skills and knowledge here so that I can eventually go back and give back to the education system in Somalia and support the children there.

Ms Ibrahim: I wanted to work here because of my own experiences of school. I had the support I needed, and I wanted to be that person for future students.

Diana: How should the education system support black students and teachers?

Mr Ahmed: It's inspiring for students to see people from minority backgrounds in higher positions, having people to look up to, to see that they can strive for any goal and not feel hindered.

Ms Morgan Black: We need more teachers from different ethnic backgrounds in Senior Leadership everywhere. Young people need to see people of from their own background in senior positions so that they aspire to follow in their footsteps and don't feel limited in what they can achieve.



JPMorgan Schools Challenge

This week the JPMorgan Schools Challenge students had their Launch events! On Monday the two groups worked together with their mentors to decide what aspect of the environment their product was aimed towards improving – air, water or food. Once they had all agreed their next tasks were to develop a slogan for their business and come up with their team names! On Tuesday the students had their second launch event. During an online seminar the students were introduced to the challenge formally and met all the other schools taking part.
