It has been another strong week for enrichment. Year 12 students took part in a wide range of activities, with ice skating proving to be a seasonal favourite once again.



Over the past two weeks, Societies students in Year 9 have been working with the poet Shareefa Energy as part of the Made in the East End project organised in collaboration with the local museum. Oxford House.

Oxford House has a long legacy of grassroots activism and of working with creatives to facilitate expression through creativity. They are continuing to build on that tradition today through the Made in the East End project, celebrating local voices and championing accessibility to the arts. Shareefa and students will explore East London's rich history of community publishing and working-class writing. They will draw inspiration from our archives and the legacy of many community groups such as the Basement Writers, a powerful collective of working-class writers active in East London during the 1970s.

The new writing will be printed in an anthology and distributed across Tower Hamlets. There will be a launch event at Oxford House theatre in May 2026, where the voung writers will share their work with their peers, families, teachers and the wider community.






CanSat club


Silver Crest

"Algorithms can create 'echo chambers." Fact: When platforms show the same kind of content repeatedly, young people can start believing that everyone thinks or behaves that way. For instance, if a teen watches political or social commentary videos with one viewpoint, they might never see balanced or opposing ideas. What parents can do: Promote curiosity. Encourage your child to check multiple news sources, follow diverse creators, or even discuss how two people can interpret the same story differently. This helps build critical thinking and perspective. Go through your child's social media with them to check on what they are seeing, keeping an eye on the balance of what they are shown.

MATHS PROBLEMOF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

Each of the numbers 1 to 9 is to be placed in a different cell of the grid shown so that the sum of the three numbers in each row is 15. Also, the sum of the two numbers in each shaded column is to be 15.

How many choices are there for the number to be placed in the central cell indicated by *?

ANSWER: The sum of the two numbers in each shaded column is 15. Therefore, one of these columns contains the numbers 7 and 8, while the other column bolds the numbers 6 and 9. Note also that two of these numbers, one from each column, combine with the number in the central cell to sum to 15. This is possible only if the number in the central cell is 1 and the shaded numbers in the central row are 6 and 8 or if the number in the central cell is 2 and the shaded numbers in the

central row are 6 and 7. The diagrams below show how the grid may be completed

correctly with either I or 2 in the central cell, though these are not the only ways of doing so.
