## **Year 10 Geography Fieldwork**

at Epping Fores

This week, our Year 10 geographers ventured into Epping Forest to carry out their GCSE fieldwork on 'How river characteristics change downstream along Loughton Brook.' Students followed the course of the brook through a range of woodland environments, stopping at several sites to collect primary data.

Working in small groups, they measured changes in channel width, depth, and river velocity. For many students, it was their first chance to apply key geographical skills outside the classroom, and they quickly discovered that rivers in real life are a little muddier, splashier and far less predictable than the diagrams in their textbooks!

Alongside the data collection, students also developed important teamwork





and problem-solving skills as they navigated slippery banks, negotiated who would go into the water first, and discussed how to ensure their measurements were both reliable and accurate. The day offered a valuable opportunity to see how physical processes shape a river from source to mouth, helping to bring to life the concepts they will later analyse in their GCSE exams.

We were incredibly proud of their enthusiasm, resilience and positive





attitude throughout the trip. A big well done to all our budding geographers for representing the school brilliantly.




# TRAIL Race Team Race Report

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Algorithms and What they show students

"The goal of most algorithms is attention, not accuracy." Fact: Apps and websites are designed to keep users scrolling for as long as possible, often by promoting content that is shocking or emotional. This can expose students to conspiracy theories, extreme opinions, or inappropriate material because it gets more clicks. What parents can do: Help your child understand that popularity doesn't mean reliability. Encourage "scroll breaks" and talk about how different apps make money from views and ads. Remind them to think, "Is this trying to inform me — or just get me to watch longer?". Go through your child's social media with them to check on what they are seeing. Ask their opinion on different posts.

#### MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

Susan is attending a talk at her son's school. There are 8 rows of 10 chairs where 54 parents are sitting.

Susan notices that every parent is either sitting on their own or next to just one other person.

What is the largest possible number of adjacent empty chairs in a single row at that talk?

ANSWER: 4 chairs

For the number of adjacent empty chairs in a single row to be a maximum, all rows apart from that one must hold as many parents as possible.

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In view of Susan's observation, the maximum number of parents sitting in any row is seven, as the upper diagram shows. Therefore, the maximum number of parents in seven of the eight rows is  $7 \times 7 = 49$ . The number in the remaining row is then 54-49=5. In that case, and again in view of Susan's observation, the maximum number of adjacent empty chairs would be four as shown in the lower diagram.

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
