Extended summary of UCAS

Ms Marvin and Mr Hibbs are proud to share that this year's UCAS deadline of 16 January has been met with a record number of applications, with 243 students successfully submitting their forms on time. This is a significant achievement and reflects the ambition, organisation and positive attitude shown by our Year 13 cohort throughout what can be a demanding process. Students approached the deadline with maturity, engaging proactively with guidance and feedback.

We have been delighted by the breadth of courses and destinations our students have applied for, including a wide range of subjects at universities both in London and across the UK. Many students have already begun receiving offers, including from a strong number of Russell Group universities, which is a real testament to their hard work and ambition.

Although the equal consideration deadline for UCAS has now passed, students are still able to submit applications. Any students who wish

to apply at this stage will continue to be fully supported, with tailored guidance available to help them explore alternative pathways, including late applications, Clearing, and other post-18 options. Mr Khan will be working closely with these students to ensure they receive appropriate advice and next steps.

Looking ahead, students who have received offers now have until 6 May to confirm their firm and insurance choices. We look forward to supporting them through this next stage of the journey and celebrating their successes as offers continue to come in.



On Tuesday, Year 9 students who have been participating in the Envision programme gave their final presentations to their peers, mentors, and a panel of judges.



MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

Sam writes on a white board the positive integers from 1 to 6 inclusive, once each. She then writes p additional fives and q sevens on the board. The mean of all the numbers on the board is then 5.3. What is the smallest possible value of q ?

ANSWER: $q = 9$

The final sum of the numbers on the board is $1 + 2 + 3 + 4 + 5 + 6 + 5p + 7q = 21 + 5p + 7q$.
As there are now $6 + p + q$ numbers on the board, $\frac{21 + 5p + 7q}{6 + p + q} = 5.3$.
Therefore $10(21 + 5p + 7q) = 53(6 + p + q)$, that is $210 + 50p + 70q = 318 + 53p + 53q$.
So $17q = 108 + 3p = 3(36 + p)$. Hence q is a multiple of 3 as 17 and 3 are coprime.
Also, as $p > 0$, $17q > 108$. Therefore $q \geq 7$.
So the smallest possible value of q is 9; and this does satisfy the conditions with $p = 15$.

Participation includes reactions

In group chats, harm is not only caused by sending messages — reacting, liking or forwarding content also plays a role in cyberbullying.

- Make it clear that forwarding, liking, reacting to or re-sharing harmful content still causes harm.
- Even "laughing along" with emojis can make a situation worse for the person being targeted.
- Encourage your child to mute, leave or report group chats where bullying or inappropriate content appears.
