Tuesday's Sixth Form Open Evening was really well attended and it was great to meet students from lots of different schools. Thank you to the Sixth Form team of organising the event.


### MAS x Bexhill visit the Royal Opera House







## MATHS PROBLEM OF THE WEEK

Did you manage to solve the maths problem this week?

Using only pieces like the one shown in the diagram, Zara wants to make a complete square without gaps or overlaps.

What is the smallest number of pieces she can use?



ANSWER: 20  
Since the total area of a square created with  $N$  of the pieces shown will be  $5N$ , we need  $5N$  to be a square number. Therefore  $N$  is of the form  $5m^2$  for some integer  $m$  and, of the options given, only 5 and 20 are of that form.

Consider first whether it is possible to create a square with 5 pieces. Such a square would be a  $5 \times 5$  square and, as shown in the diagrams below, it is then only possible to cover the central cell in one of two ways (rotations and reflections of the arrangements shown being essentially the same).



Whichever of these two arrangements is used to cover the central cell, it is easy to see that the remaining cells cannot be covered with four more of the pieces and hence it is impossible to build a square with 5 of the pieces shown.

However, since two of the pieces can be placed next to each other to form a  $5 \times 2$  rectangle as shown,



and 10 of these rectangles can easily be combined to create a  $10 \times 10$  square, a square can be built using 20 pieces.

## SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD TO STAY SAFE ONLINE

### The law applies online too

Many young people are unaware that UK law applies to online behaviour, including what is sent, shared or forwarded in group chats.

- Remind your child that sharing or forwarding abusive, threatening or inappropriate content can have legal consequences.
- Young people can be held responsible not just for sending messages, but also for forwarding, liking or sharing them.
- The safest choice is always to stop content spreading by not engaging with it at all.
