Sixth Form News

It has been a very busy week in the Sixth Form with a number of important events and opportunities for students. Mock examinations have taken place this week, particularly for Year 13 students. These exams are an important opportunity to reflect on progress ahead of the final examination period. Students should use the feedback from these assessments carefully and take time to review what worked well in their revision and where improvements can be made.

On Tuesday, a group of students attended a visit to KPMG, providing a valuable insight into the world of professional services and apprenticeship pathways. During the visit, students learned about different career routes within the organisation, including school leaver and degree apprenticeship programmes. They also had the opportunity to hear directly

from professionals working in the industry about their career journeys, the skills required in the workplace, and the opportunities available for students after sixth form.

Yesterday we also welcomed the King's Trust Mosaic Programme to the Sixth Form. This forms part of a series of seven workshops designed to support students who are interested in pursuing apprenticeships or entering the workplace after sixth form. Through mentoring, guidance, and practical activities, the programme aims to help students build confidence, develop employability skills, and explore pathways into work or training. We are looking forward to continuing the programme over the coming weeks!

Year 12 students also took part in an excellent VESPA Day, focusing on reflection and improvement across their study habits. Students spent time

considering how they organise their revision, manage their time, and approach their learning in lessons. A key focus was identifying and improving their "weakest domains" within the VESPA model. Students should now review their coaching reports carefully, track their progress, and continue working towards the goals they have set.

Finally, congratulations to the many Year 13 students who are continuing to receive university offers, including offers from leading Russell Group universities. This is a fantastic achievement and reflects the hard work students have put into their applications. We look forward to celebrating many more offers in the weeks ahead.

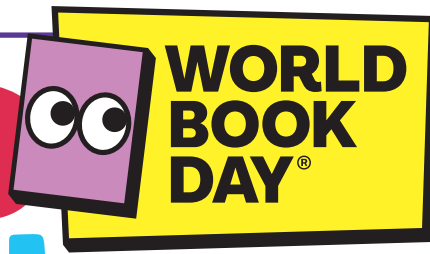

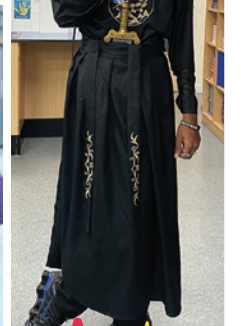
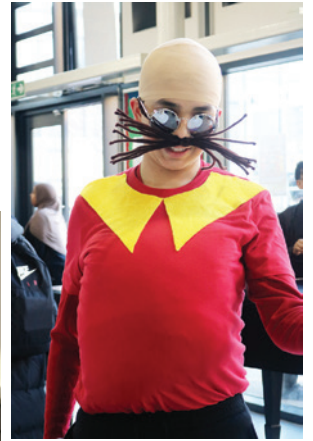
WORLD BOOK DAY



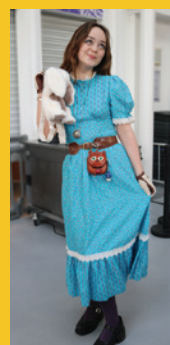
We've been celebrating books and reading throughout the week, with lots of activities in the library. On Thursday students dressed up as their favourite book character and there were ten winners for the best costumes.
