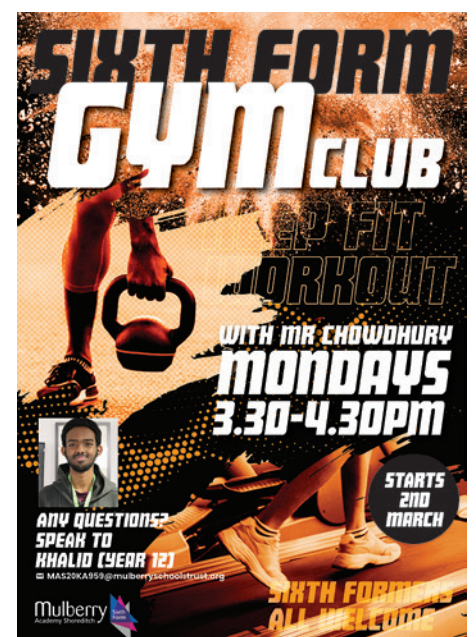

Surviving the Holocaust

On Wednesday 18th March a group of Year 9 and Year 12 History students took part in an outreach session with the Holocaust Educational Trust. We were visited by Chris Shaw, the son of Holocaust survivor Isobel Lowy, who shared his mother's story of surviving Auschwitz, Buchenwald and Bergen-Belsen and how she re-built her life in Sweden and then Britain after the war. Hearing about her attitude of living her life to the fullest and refusing to carry bitterness



and hatred despite her horrific experiences was powerful and inspiring. The talk also illuminated many details of the topics Year 9 have recently been studying, on Hitler and the Nazis. We were impressed with the range of thoughtful and perceptive questions asked by the students during the Q&A session.

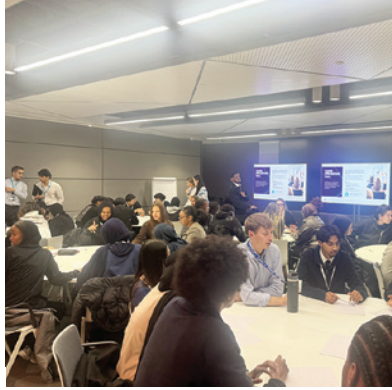

Supporting your child to stay safe online

Children can feel pressure to keep conversations going

Young people often worry about seeming rude if they ignore messages, even when they would rather not continue a conversation. Frequent notifications can create a sense that they must reply immediately.
